




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CHRISTMAS LUNCH






Teaching Assistant, also went down a treat with pupils.

The SENDIAS team based at Manor Farm also supported a number of pupils with the donation of a number Christmas gifts which were also gratefully received by the relevant families.

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






UNDER THE SPOTLIGHT

Unfortunately, the fantastic opportunity that our year 9 pupils experience by visiting Kidzania in London, will not be taking place this year due to the sudden closure of the venue. We are obviously disappointed with this news, as from previous experience, we know how much pupils have enjoyed having a taster of possible future career options. We hope to be able to offer some other alternative for our year 9 pupils to attend.

KNIFE ANGEL VISITS

Selected pupils recently embarked on an educational visit to the Knife Angel statue as part of their studies in Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) lessons. This experience aimed to not only broaden their perspectives but also encourage discussions on the impact of violence and the importance of community in addressing issues with knife crime.

The striking sculpture is made from more than 100,000 bladed weapons that have been blunted and welded together and was created to raise awareness of knife crime and violence. The statue, also known as the National Monument Against Violence and Aggression was created by sculptor Alfie Bradley at the British Ironworks Centre in Oswestry, Shropshire and the blades used to create it, were all seized by Police forces across the country.





This towering artwork stands as a symbol against violence and knife crime, serving as a stark reminder of the devastating consequences associated with such actions. Encountering the Knife Angel encourages pupils to empathise with the victims of knife crime, their families, and surrounding communities. By witnessing the scale of the problem through the visual representation of surrendered knives, pupils are prompted to reflect on the human cost of violence and the importance of fostering a compassionate society. During the visit, one Yr 10 pupil said, "I can't believe how many knives have been used in the statue" "I hope people understand the meaning of this statue because I've noticed not many people have even acknowledged the statue" another Yr 11 pupil quoted "I wonder how many lives were lost, how many people have died with each knife".
