#### 1 Why are we talking about this?

#### Career:

The job or series of jobs that you do during your working life, especially if you continue to get better jobs and earn more money.



## 1 Why are we talking about this?





A study last year found that 60% of young people want to be their own boss by the age of 30.

Being your own boss is when you are self-employed. This could be working on your own or being a business owner where you employ other people. National Careers Week runs from Monday 4<sup>th</sup> March to Friday 8<sup>th</sup> March. Now is a good time to think about some of your future options.




I get to follow my own vision and passions.
