### FUNDAY FRIDAYS

Funday Fridays are a curriculum enhancement that looks to support your child’s personal development – in addition the breadth of the school’s curriculum. Pupils progress through a carousel of activities. These activities act as vehicles to develop your child’s **communication, leadership and preparation for adulthood** as well as them demonstrating the school’s observable behaviours aligned to our values of Care for Self, Others and the Environment.

Staff will utilise the group’s success within communication, leadership and preparation for adulthood to plan for opportunities to address in their next activity.

These experiences are a core component of your child’s education and are not a reward trip. They are an essential experience that supports the school’s curriculum.

This half terms activities include: Historic immersive trips to Warwick Castle, The Black Country Museum and RAF Cosford, travel experiences, community work, creating a class assembly, and enterprising ideas for fund raising.

Here are a selection of IMPACT measures following this half terms experience:

#### Nurture

7a worked as a team demonstrating trust, independence, and co-operation as they filmed activities to create an assembly – we can’t wait to see it!

7b were enterprising extraordinaires raising money for their defibrillator by organising a raffle and prizes.

7c all checked in excitedly about working in the community to make it a cleaner and tidier place – great job guys.

8a created a Bullock Production fantastic assembly on raising funds and showing what fun it can be. The whole school have already enjoyed watching the film which showed humour, team work, and great communication skills by all.

8b got themselves from school to Birmingham Airport using a variety of public transport experiences and conducted themselves brilliantly throughout the day.



#### Transition

Year 9 went to The Black Country Museum using public transport and loved their time experiencing the coal mine. Pupils showed genuine interest and curiosity in our local history and enjoyed conversing with the volunteers to find out more about what life was like 300 years ago.



Year 10 took a trip to the cinema and enjoyed an entertaining day all-round. The group were able to work through prior challenges and tensions in school and were able to come together as a group and enjoy each other’s company in a more informal setting.

#### Pathways

Year 11 joined together to venture on a magical day to Warwick Castle. Pupils who have previously highlighted anxiety and worry about being offsite, all overcame their fears and attended on what was one of our favourite days out yet. Pupils took a walk through the dungeons experiencing scary scenes then contrasted their day with elegance and luxury witnessing the historical beauty of the castle itself. All pupils took great delight in watching Mrs F face her fears of birds while they enjoyed a Birds of Prey display in the glorious sunshine of the castle grounds. A day year 11 will undoubtedly remember for its entertainment, laughter, and for all pupils living into our Elmwood Values.

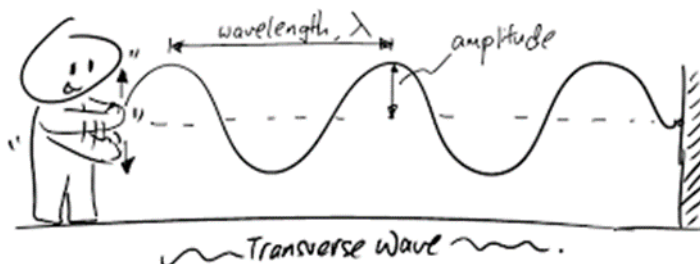

## Science in the woods – surely not!

A group of key stage 3 pupils recently spent a day in the woods of Leicestershire to enhance their science learning. The first part of the day the pupils explored sound and sound waves. A rope allowed them to produce a transverse wave, the faster the rope was moved the greater the wavelength. The greater the force, the larger the amplitude. Pupils were also able to feel an echo through the rope – an echo occurs when sound waves are reflected towards the hearer.



Ellis mastered the Aboriginal Bullroarer, which is a wing shaped piece of dense wood attached to a cord, it produces a low-pitched hum when sung correctly.



Pupils also learnt about the current in electrical circuits, and resistance, before they lit fires using wire wool and a 9v battery and a friction drill.

A fun day was had by all and we learnt that that if you stand too close to a rope making waves, you could get Hertz.

FOSSIL HUNTING IN OUT AND ABOUT LESSONS

In out and about lessons, we have enjoyed trips to the world famous Wrens Nest, home of the 'Dudley Bug'.



Known for its trilobites, crinoids and coral fossils, we have used paint brushes to gently collect these. Pupils have been very excited to see the 400 million year old seabed from the tropical Silurian sea.



These visits have been planned to link with the work in science, where we have been studying the earth and rock formations. Pupils have informed me of the sedimentary process and how limestone is formed.

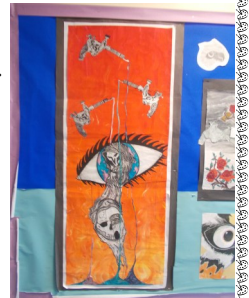
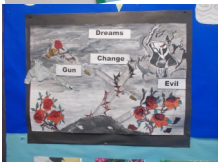
