


There were some fabulous outfits and it certainly was a case of who's that behind the mask.

Elmwood pupils were impeccably behaved during the short ceremony in honour of all of the soldiers who gave their today so that we could have our tomorrow. The ceremony was held around the barn area of the school where Paul Middleton had beautifully painted a backdrop of a poppy field; he was also our official photographer for the morning. Andy Singer, who is the lead veteran, commented on how amazing all our pupils are and it is truly their honour to attend, and to be a part of Elmwood's ceremony.

Year 7s decorated biscuits and cakes with poppies. Year 8s made a very heart warming vegetable chowder to serve to the veterans when they came in from the cold outside. Charlie-ann Barfield, Kayden Cox and Courtney Allport made and decorated a beautiful remembrance day cake. BTEC food pupils made pumpkin soup and freshly made bread rolls which the regiment commented on how delicious it all was, with some of our guests taking home the recipes. Year 10 made a variety of cakes boxed up for the veterans to take home with them for family and friends. Year 11 pupils played hosts serving tea and coffee for the morning chatting with the veterans about where they had served and what the soldiers had experienced. Miles Hall in Year 11 managed to raise an additional £2.85 for the British Legion from donations he made for drinks.
